As a famous Chinese political leader said twenty years ago, "it doesn't matter whether your cat is black or white, providing it catches mice" – that means being a person of action who gets things done, who supports others and does good things for them.

Could I suggest to you all that disadvantage of any kind is not a destination in life, nor is it an ordained destiny? We are all able to achieve great things like Mr Raukura – how far you go in life is dependent on your attitude. If it is a 'can do' one you will be able to shoot for the stars and be happy in your life.

I conclude by again warmly congratulating your wonderful teacher, Kane Raukura, who is today given the very special honour of being a five star, first class teacher of excellence. We salute you Kane and honour you!! THANK YOU for the inspiration, dedication and hard work you put into the lives of your students at De La Salle College.
