Dear Editor

In Auckland, we have started to charge admission to major ITFNZ Taekwon-Do tournaments and reduced competitor entry fees. Charging for admission is part of a strategy to increase the public profile of ITFNZ Taekwon-Do. In future, we will send free passes to local radio stations and newspapers to give away as prizes. Complimentary passes to something with free admission have no value. Indeed, people unconsciously place less value on something that is free than something for which they pay. (Do you buy drinking water, or do you refuse to pay for it because you do not think it is worth \$2 a bottle?)

This method will have three key benefits. First, they give us free radio and newspaper advertising, which reach more people than circumstantial passers-by and increase public awareness. Second, anybody who makes use of those passes may join ITFNZ Taekwon-Do, increasing our membership. Third, these people may bring friends, who will pay for admission, so we can reduce the financial burden of tournaments on our members by transferring some of it to the general public.

Many activities charge admission into major events, including gymnastics, dance and music. Some martial arts groups charge up to \$8 per person for local tournaments! In some ways we are following their lead. But we have very clear reasons for doing so. If we find the technique successful, we will encourage its spread to other regions.

World Championships 2001 - Competitors' Insights

It is a special honour to be chosen to represent your country, and it was with a feeling of this privilege as well as a fair degree of nervousness and anticipation that the team departed New Zealand in late June 2001 for the 12th World Championships in Rimini, Italy.

Fantastic coverage of the Championships was provided via the ITFNZ website by Mr McPhail and the Breen family, so this article will attempt not to replicate this information with a blow-by-blow chronological account of what happened. Rather we hope to give readers an idea of what it is like to compete in such an event, and also to share some (hopefully) interesting experiences that we had.

We had a couple of days in Rome

before heading up to Rimini. We took the chance to do some sightseeing around the historic sights, although with the constant thought of the competition that was looming it was difficult to ever fully relax. Everyone was also terrified of injuring ourselves or getting sick, and then according to Murphy's Law, Kylee tripped coming down the steps of St Peter's Cathedral in the Vatican City, wrenching her toe that had been healing from a previous injury. Thankfully, in the end she was able to compete without it bothering her too much. A highlight for many while in Rome was the Colosseum, the ultimate competition arena, and I think many were glad we were only to be facing Koreans and Polish in the ring rather than armed gladiators and hungry tigers.

The two days in Rimini before the competition started were spent

nervously filling in time and also a couple of sweaty training sessions. Everyone was feeling pretty good, although the heat was tough. Many may have heard of Toni's ordeal of making weight for her sparring division, although can we just re-emphasize the whole-hearted commitment she displayed in sweating it out for hours that morning and then even having her hair cut off. It was inspiring for everyone to see this level of dedication demonstrated.

When the competition began, the attitude and professionalism of everyone there was obvious. In the sparring, certain competitors really seemed to stand out, and some of the skills were nothing short of incredible. As always, the sparring was hard with very few fouls being called for excessive contact. The sparring seemed to be particularly furious this time with less of the bouncing and waiting seen previously, perhaps due in part to the ring-size being down to 8x8m rather than 9x9m.

In terms of the patterns, once again

On the day of Toni's weigh in, she was 2kg over her limit. She rose at 6:25am and hit the hotel treadmill clothed in tracksuits. At 7:15am, she had to stop because the bus was early. Toni continued to train waiting for the bus, and in the centre. At 9:45am, she weighed in at 1kg over. She was tired, shaking and looking unwell, and had only

45mins to lose the weight – Mr Salton and Mr McPhail recommended she stop two or three times. But Toni refused to give up.

Mr McPhail wrote: "Toni was amazing...she worked harder than I have seen her and showed a spirit that was inspiring to all of us. Those team members who were there

joined in and helped, and she was near collapse at 10:30am. Finally Toni insisted that Carmen CUT HER HAIR, as it was so wet and heavy."

When she was called up at 10:30am, Toni made the limit. The team was so relieved – everyone was hugging and crying. For Mr McPhail, this was a highlight of the tournament.



the judges seemed to favour the crisp, rigid style over technical correctness; frustrating when you have trained so hard to be technically correct. Another thing the Koreans in particular do is flick their head in the direction of the

technique at the last second. A strategy of the Koreans during patterns competition was to often wait and choose the same optional pattern as their opponent, thus counting on any one of their patterns being better than their opponent's favourite one. For team sparring, we also noticed that the Korean men sometimes only took 3 sets of sparring gear into the ring that is confidence.

Actually, this occurred because they were using borrowed sparring gear, and we had to limit team sparring to three sets of gear per team. Otherwise we'd have run out.

The men's hyper-weight sparring final between Korea and Poland I found particularly interesting. Early in the first round the Korean fell awkwardly and dislocated his shoulder. The first aid personnel spent some time with him and managed to relocate it into place, however he was obviously still in a great deal of pain. He looked across to his coach who sternly motioned him to continue. The bout restarted, however the Korean was clutching his injured arm into his side and was completely unable to defend himself. As he was getting pummeled, he kept looking across to his coach who continued to urge him on. After a short while the referee stopped the bout to the disgust of the Korean coach but the relief of everyone else. I felt as if

the Korean coach was making a statement on behalf of the team of the degree of their spirit and that Korea would never quit. The ethics of this are somewhat questionable, however it was a striking example of the attitude of the countries competing there.

Some of the women's sparring at the tournament stood out from the rest. One of the noisiest was the match between the Slovenian and Argentinean women's micro-weights. While the two determined ladies hammered each other with super-fast kicks and near knock-out punches, their supporters cheered and it was all LOUD. The Slovenian supporters were jumping up and down on the bleachers armed with a big drum, chanting along to an energetic beat 'GO BIANCA, GO!' In their hands they waved around huge block letters that read their words. After the second bout and much suspense the result

was a draw so a third round was fought and what a round it was. Both competitors looked absolutely hammered but were determined to win and showed great spirit. In the end the Slovenian girl's hand was raised and the disappointed Argentinean coach got up and snatched an appeal form from the judges. He obviously had other thoughts on the match but did go and congratulate the winner and her coach. Bianca Tapilatu went on to win gold in the division and later in the competition in the men's light-weight another Slovenian, Tomaz Barada, took a gold. It turned out to be her partner, now how cool is that?

Bianca's parents were part of the Organising Committee - wow, were they proud parents! Her coach was none other than our old friend, Mr Willy van de Mortel.

Another awesome spectacle was between previous World Champs women's light-weight gold medallist, Julia Cross, from Scotland and the 1997 Russia World Champs gold medallist from Germany. After *ijunbi* before each round both girls practically roared at each other as opposed to *kihap*. Tremendous skill was exhibited by both competitors. The German girl spat out sidekicks like lightning accompanied by thunderous *kihap* glaring at her opponent with absolute determination and confidence. Ms Cross countered with whipping reverse hooking kicks with just as much sting and aggression. She was backed by the Scottish team cheering, 'YOU ARE JULIA, YOU ARE JULIA!'. After two rounds of awesome sparring a draw was called so we were lucky to witness a third round between the two girls. The last round got really intense where both competitors spat out fire-like combinations, but in the end the German girl managed to outscore her opponent and won bronze. We had a little chat with Ms Cross afterwards and found out that it was her fifth time competing at the Champs and on her first attempt she won bronze. She had also been suffering the effects of food poisoning in the days leading up to the competition.

Ms Cross' food poisoning was quite serious. She had spent a couple of days in hospital, and had to pull out of the patterns division. She was very disappointed.

The last two days of the tournament were particularly interesting with all the semi-finals and the finals of competition. One memory was watching the Korean women's middle-weight sparrer win gold, then quickly

whipping off her sparring gear, while getting an earful from her coach, jump in the neighboring ring for the 3rd dan patterns final. In between her optional and designated patterns as she turned around to redo her belt she looked up at her coach who seemed to still be yelling something at her with a look to kill on her face. The Korean won the patterns round and ran happily into her coaches arms who now appeared overjoyed with her performance. Looking around at some of the other competitors and their coaches the similar focus on winning was seen. We saw one girl get hit across the face by her coach at half-time during a sparring match and another got punched in the chest. Ouch!

The last day of the competition ended with us doing a fantastic haka on the center ring after Master Bos had finished all the formal presentations. The boys in the middle looked very

energetic, shirtless with team tracksuit pants, and the girls skillfully swinging their poi on the outskirts in a more modest version of the tracksuit. Everyone enjoyed the performance. A lot of people wanted to swap for the NZ team tracksuit but not many of us wanted to part with our lovely garments, so for all you future NZ team competitors be ready to be eyed up and down by hungry tracksuit swappers. The Champs ended with an awesome party at a club about an hour away from our Hotel. We all partied the night away, with some cutting it fine on their train and flight connections the next morning.

While the team was naturally disappointed not to come away with any medals this time, we felt overall that we had performed well and with a bit more luck we could have had a few medals. So we know that we were competitive and return home with our heads held high. The 2001 NZ Taekwon-Do team members would like to take this final opportunity to thank all those who supported us in our bid to take on the world's best. In particular our coaches Mr Salton and Mr McPhail, our managers Carmen and Debbie, our major sponsors ITFNZ Taekwon-Do and Botany Downs Town Centre, our individual sponsors and all supporters back home. So ask yourself, do you think you have what it takes for Poland 2003? Have a go and find out!

Organising the World Championships?

I met Master Wim (pronounced iVimí) Bos a couple of times when I lived in Europe in 1994 and 1995, and kept in touch when I came home. When I heard he was hosting the 12th World Championships, I emailed him and said I was looking forward to travelling to the event, maybe as an umpire. Master Bos asked me if I would like to help on the Organising Committee. After initial concerns as to what this involved, I jumped at the chance. Master Bos assured me that my involvement would be purely at the event, from 1 to 9 July 2001.

On 19 January, I received an email from Master Bos that listed my duties as iofficial and closing ceremony coordinator, inside - outside hall arrangements, congress hall coordinator and I was one of many with secretarial duties. Quite a list! Others on the list of organisers were like a Whois Who of ITF Taekwon-Do in Europe - I thought I had better get good at making coffee!

The next six months passed without further detail from Master Bos (although he did say my iwife could help too!). I was becoming a bit concerned because *national* tournaments involve enough work. Master Bos was very relaxed, iJust call me when you arrive in Rome.î

The day after we arrived in Rome (my birthday), Master Bos took Michelle and I out to dinner. I discovered we had no need for concern. Master Bos had everything under control. We chatted over a lovely meal, and I got to pick his brains a bit about tournament rules. A few days later we met for lunch,

and I took a photograph of Master Bos with his scooter (a most common mode of transport in Rome, but quite a contrast to his Mercedes).

Michelle and I arrived in Rimini on 1 July. The New Zealand team had arrived a day earlier, and it was great to see them. We couldn't talk long, however, because we were just in time for lunch at the hotel. After lunch, we went back to the venue and helped to set up the centre.

We soon discovered our roles were more istaff than iorganisers. We helped put up flags, laid the mats for the centre ring and created ad hoc signs. (It is very difficult to use PowerPoint in Italian!) We had numerous laughs and language difficulties with the other staff (a team of Master Bos's students). Fortunately there was a Scotsman, Mr John McIlvany, with whom we could converse more freely. (Unfortunately I missed the biggest laugh. The team were bringing out big wooden boards to stack for the awards podium, and John came out lugging a huge wooden cross on his shoulder. iWhat do I do with this?î)

Michelle, who only recently joined Taekwon-Do, ended up helping with the VIPs. This was entertaining at times. iWho's that?î iThat's Grand Master Park Jung Soo.î iWho's that?î iThat's Master Choi Jung Hwa.î And the all time classic: iOne of the masters gave me a pen - that nice one who translated for General Choi.î iGrand Master Rhee.î iYes. How will I remember who it is from?î iThat image on the side is from a famous photo of

I spent all four competition days securing one of the entrances to the competition area. It was a great opportunity to meet coaches and see old friends. I also got some of the best views of the tournament: all of Aaron McIlwee's bouts were in my ring (a highlight for me), among others.

It was a very tiring week. We worked quite long hours, and only made it to the beach for five minutes on the night of the party. However, it was a fantastic experience, and I learned a lot about running such an efficient tournament. Master Bos was wonderful to us, as were the other organisers and staff. I would like to offer them my sincere thanks, and I look forward to (umpiring in) Warsaw in 2003. Maybe one day we could host a World Championship tournament in New Zealand!

The Tournament Sub-committee is in the process of reviewing the management of future World Championship teams. It is hoped that the procedure to be adopted will assist everyone to understand the needs and expectations of being a team member, a coach/assistant coach and a manager/assistant manager.

The Instructors' Conference will be held 21-23 September 2001. Many instructors have already registered. Will you be there to acquire some innovative ideas on: how to be a

creative instructor, taking care of business, life and death self defence, where ITFNZ is going in the future, and practical demonstrations of teaching of patterns, step sparring, free sparring and self defence? In April 2001, NZOC convened a meeting with representatives from ITFNZ, NZTF and TUNZ. A loose agreement was reached to provide a path for NZTF to join the Taekwon-Do Council of New Zealand but only time will tell whether such a union will become a reality.

- The other member of the Executive Committee is Mr Vince Pygott, our Secretary.

March Executive Committee Meeting

- New flags have been ordered. A new tie is being considered. When these are available, one tie per instructor, one tie per official assistant instructor and one flag per club will be supplied free of charge.
- Sue Breen was appointed Sales Officer.
- A special welcome to 3 clubs from the NZ TKD Academy and its instructors, Messrs Don Booth, Wayne Ebert and Blair Martin.
- The Tournament Sub-committee

was asked to poll the instructors whether the National tournament should be a closed or open event.

- Ms C. Schwager and Mr P. McPhail briefed the committee re the World Championship team and some funding issues. The committee decided that any money provided by ITFNZ shall be given directly to the team members.
- The Tournament Sub-committee should budget for NZ training expenses for the National Coach and Manager in its Annual Budget.
- Applications for the Senior National Coach and Manager close on 31 August 2001.

July Executive Committee Meeting

- Mr Ng gave a brief on the developments of the NZTC.
- UGS is for everyone to apply to. We would like more applicants, however there is only a limited amount of funding to go around.
- Tournament Sub-committee is revamping the tournament rules, with Mr Joe looking at dividing up the Tournament Document and more control of the International Teams going to be implemented.
- Overwhelming majority of instructors wanted the Nationals as a closed event. (77%)
- Instructors will be receiving a 3yr

Management Plan to peruse and supply comments on prior to the Instructors conference.

- Exec meetings are open to Exec members and Sub-committee Directors only. Other people wishing to have a say should go through their Regional Directors.



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

- It was really good for hiding in.




Are they gone yet?

In the late 1500's, the Shogun of Japan sent his troops to invade Korea. Their Man-of-War boats each had one cannon and muskets.



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
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
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
